Maintaining a Gas Fireplace vs. Wood Fireplace

Wood fireplaces are also going to experience creosote buildup which will require frequent chimney cleanings. Gas fireplaces are pretty much as easy to maintain as they are to operate. They do not require as much clean up after every fire and you will not be required to sweep the chimney as often as with wood fires. A gas fireplace chimney will only need to be cleaned

when there is soot residue on the inner wall of the pipe. Both should be inspected for debris blockages before the heating season.

Ease of Operation



If you want a fire at the flick of a switch then you should be looking for a gas fireplace. Gas fireplaces can be operated via remotes or switches that allow you to literally flip a switch or push a button then sit back and enjoy your fire. Wood fireplaces are not going to be quite as simple. You will have to gather the firewood, build the fire, establish the fire, and then tend the fire to keep it going.

Authentic Fires



In my personal opinion when it comes to the experience of a fireplace, wood has the advantage. Both gas and wood fireplaces will provide you with dancing flames and heat, but if you're looking for authenticity in your fire you may be left disappointed with a gas fireplace. With a gas fireplace you will not have the authentic sounds and smells of a traditional fire. Sometimes you will have an even a lesser flame presentation.

Based on everything that we have covered today it may seem like it's a 50/50 split between gas and wood fireplaces, Even though I am a wood burner, I will admit that the benefits of a gas fireplace do outweigh those of a wood fireplace. So if you're really just looking to use your fireplace only once in a while on special occasions a gas fireplace would be the way to go.
